KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

All youth in the custody of Child Protective Services have the right to have their voices heard in court hearings about their case.

Recent changes to youth court laws guarantee foster youth the following rights in court:

- Written summons to appear in all court hearings related to your case
- Legal standing in your court case acknowledgement that this impacts your life
- Representation by an attorney with undivided loyalty to you
- Opportunity to share your wishes with the court

As an equal party to all matters concerning your case, you are responsible for the following:

- Communicate with your attorney all needs, concerns, and wishes that need to be addressed in court
- Request changes to your representation if you feel the attorney is not representing your interests in the case
- Behave in a respectful manner in all court proceedings
- Following all instructions from the court

Legal Terms to Understand

- Guardian Ad Litem: attorney appointed by the judge to represent the "best interest" of the child in the case
- Best Interest: action that maximizes what is best for the child
- Party: a person or entity that takes part in a legal act
- Standing: a legal interest or stake in a court case; right to be involved in a court case
- Termination of Parental Rights: legally ending the plan to return a child to their parents
- Undivided Loyalty: only represents the wishes of the youth
- Permanency: long-term plan for youth that involves belonging in family and community
- Summons: request to attend a court hearing
